### 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

#### 1.1 INTRODUCTION

Poornaprajna College, popularly known as PPC, is situated in a vast green campus at the heart of Udupi city. It is at a short distance of 1 KM from Udupi Bus Stand, 4 KMs from Udupi Railway Station and about 45 KMs from Mangalore Air Port. Poornaprajna College is one of the educational institutions run by Udupi Sri Admar Mutt Education Council formerly headed by H. H. Sri Sri Vibudhesha Theertha Swamiji of Sri Admar Mutt. Now, the Council is functioning under the leadership of H. H. Sri Sri Eeshapriya Theertha Swamiji of Sri Admar Mutt. Poornaprajna College was founded in 1960 by the Swamijis of eight Mathas of Udupi. But, in February 1962, with a view to streamline the day-to-day working of the institution, its maintenance and governance were handed over to Admar Matha Education Council, a registered society functioning under the leadership of **H. H. Sri Sri Vibudhesha Theertha Swamiji** of Admar Matha. Now, the Council is functioning under the leadership of **H. H. Sri Sri Vishwapriya Theertha Swamiji** of Sri Admar Matha.

Initially, the College offeres courses in Science, Commerce, and Humanities streams. In its early days, the College had the privilege of having eminent scholars and writers like Prof. V.M. Inamdar, Dr. Shankar Mokasi Punekar, Prof. Gopalakrishna Adiga and Dr. P. Narayana Rao as its Principals. After these titans, the tradition was continued by able administrators such as Prof. K.G. Tantry, Prof. Sripathi Upadhya, Prof. H. Shivarama Shetty, Prof. Sudhakar Rao, Prof. M. Subrahmanya, Prof. N. B. Dixit, Dr. S. L. Karnik, Prof. A. K. Halapet, Dr. N.A. Madyastha, Prof. S. Subhashchandra and Prof. Rajmohan, Prof.K.Sadashiva Rao, Dr B. Jagadeesh Shetty, Dr. A.P. Bhat. Presently Dr. Raghavendra A is heading the institution.

The year 2009-10 being the 50th year, was celebrated as the Golden Jubilee Year. To commemorate the golden jubilee year celebration, an indoor stadium complex was constructed.

The college has been conferred the "Award of Excellence" by Udupi Chamber of Commerce & Industry on 10-06-2012 for being the best college in Udupi district in the category of "Advanced Eduction" for the year 2011.

- The college offers two post-graduate degree courses, i.e. M.Sc. (Mathematics) and M.Com. which supports the students of PPC in fulfilling their desire of obtaining higher education easily.
- Easy access to the post-graduation and research degrees to the students of PPC from nearby institutions.
- Re-enforcing the Alumni network is another opportunity that enhances the avenues of college to reach every sphere of the society.

### 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

#### **Curricular Aspects**

Being an affiliated college, Poornaprajna College follows the scheme and syllabus prescribed by Mangalore University. It offers eleven Undergraduate programmes and two post-graduate programmes under Choice Based Credit System. The college calendar is prepared in accordance with the academic calendar of the parent university which directs the stakeholders in the college to carry out all activities in an academic year.

IQAC ensures transparency, confidentiality and smooth conduct of internal and external examinations in the prescribed time-frame. The faculty of the college are the members of BoS, BOE of parent University who contribute to frame the syllabus of UG and certificate courses and also set of question papers for semester examinations and certificate courses.

The students are introduced to the values like ethics, human values, equity, environmental sustainability that are embedded in the curriculum and the same are imparted and through EC&CC activities.

Apart from the prescribed courses, the teachers have conducted 53 Certificate Courses during the assessment period for which the design and development of curriculum and examination process were effectively carried out. These courses developed the academic skills and employable competencies among students. During the COVID-19 pandemic period, 70.99% of students have admitted for the certificate courses.

Structured feedback is collected to analyze the opinion of stakeholders on curriculum and academic issues. The suggestions from the students, teachers, employers, and parents are considered while offering new certificate courses and framing the syllabus for certificate courses. The online feedback form is also available on the institutional website for ease of access to the students. The feedback for the assessment period was also collected manually.

#### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

The process of students' transparent admission is assured with the adaption of norms of the concerned authorities and governments. Students from diverse socio-cultural and economic background admit in the college who were nourished with the mentor-mentee mechanism throughout their tenure at the campus. The college offers student-centric education with appropriate pedagogy for arts, commerce, science streams that encompasses learning through participation, experiments, and collaboration. Even though the college follows the syllabi of host University, the departments have innovative and creative practices such as class demonstration, use of NPTEL and SWAYAM courses, sharing study material on the web, tutorials for competitive examination.

To offer the value education in the curriculum, contents such as Human values, environment sustainability, moral values; Ethics, Gender sensitivity are integrated in the curriculum. Certificate courses offered in the college instils the essential skills required for a graduate.

The college transparently follows continuous evaluation process of students' performance as per the policy and schedule in the academic calendar. Examination grievances are efficiently attended through Grievances redressal cell

#### Research, Innovations and Extension

The college promotes activities that inculcate the passion of research and innovation among the students and teachers. Seven research grants were received worth of Rs. 5.04 Lakh rupees. Various departments have been organizing conferences, seminars, and workshops on curriculum based concepts that enhance the students' interest towards research. The college has organized 9 workshops/seminars on research methodology, Intellectual Property Rights, and Entrepreneurship.

Seven projects have received grants worth of Rupees 5.04 Lakhs. The faculty of the college have been published more than 80 research papers in UGC notified journals, 55 book chapters, and a good amount of publications in national and state level journals, magazines, and newspapers.

The students have been involved in innovative activities leading to the development of a sensor based automatic sanitizer dispenser, Automatic light sensing & time controlled switching technology that manages the street lights on the campus.

The college has a MoU with Poornaprajna Institute of Scientific Research (PPISR) which promotes the students' interaction with scientists of PPISR. The students visit the PPISR campus during the summer school program to discuss and understand the nature of research at PPISR. The college has organized and participated in 36 collaborative activities.

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The college has Poornaprajna Amateur Astronomers Club (PAAC) that is continuously enhancing the interest of students towards astronomy through regular 'sky watch programs', special talks. The students have been created and disseminated an innovative tool i.e. 'Pin Hole Camera' to school students to watch the solar eclipse. The club has received appreciations from the US based astronomical club that is willing to share the works of PAAC.

The college has a rich culture of extension and outreach programmes promoted by NSS, NCC, and YRC. A total of 9436 students have participated in 171 extension and outreach programmes during five years.

The college has submitted a proposal to Mangalore University to establish a research centre in the campus

#### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

With amidst green campus, the college spread across 6.49 acres. The college is located at the heart of the city which has nearby access to Rail, Road, and Air transportation. The college has 42 classrooms with adequate IT infrastructure, 11 laboratories of science departments, 2 seminar halls, E-learning centre, audio-visual room, open theatre, independent library building, and departmental libraries. The college has procured more than 100 computers, 19 projectors, adopted the Internet connection of >50MBPS bandwidth, and software support system for academic and administrative activities during 2016-2021.

The college has developed and maintained the Archaeology Museum, Botany museum, and Zoology museum with respective artefacts and samples. The college also facilitates the students with hostel facilities for men and women to confirm comfortable stay at the campus. The college library has a vast collection of more than 58,000 books supported with OPAC search system. The library subscribed to the N-List consortium that provide access to 6000+ electronic journals and more than 1,99,500+ e-books along with the NDL database. More than 10.36 Lakhs of Rupees was spent on library's collection development in the assessment period.

The college provides indoor and outdoor sports facilities that include essential equipments and established grounds for both forms of sports. The gym is equipped with cardio instruments. The college has strong room for examination, independent rooms for NSS, NCC, and IQAC. The college conducts various cultural and academic programmes in Mini auditorium, Poorna Prajna Auditorium, Open theatre, and Vibhudesh Theertha Sabhangana.

In addition to the activities of the college, the infrastructure is utilized for conducting examination of KPSC, Police Department. The college also facilitates to share its infrastructure with NCC wings of various colleges to conduct examinations. The infrastructural facilities in the college are maintained through a policy which directs the AMC service providers to maintain the equipments and instruments in conformity with the agreement. Overall the college has spent more than Rs. 230 Lakhs towards infrastructure augmentation during the years 2016-2021.

The college is planning to build an independent science block with State of the Art infrastructure facilities.

#### **Student Support and Progression**

The college supports the students through academic facilities, financial supports, counselling, and skill enhancement programmes to ensure their progress. The college has channelized the financial support for the

economically challenged students through the Government and Non-Government scholarships including the financial support from the president of the Admar Mutt Education Council.

A total of 1668 students i.e. 21.11% of the total students have received a total of Rs. 92,58,771/- of scholarship during the years 2016-2021. Of this, 52.96% of scholarships were from Government schemes followed by Swamiji's financial assistance (28.69%), and non-government schemes (18.34%).

The college has also taken initiatives to conduct programs on capacity building and skill enhancement, career guidance through programmes like special talks, training programmes, awareness programmes. Students' grievances about facilities, ragging, and harassment are received through oral, written, and online mode which later addressed according to the policy. The college encourages the students to pursue higher education and support them to set employment through campus selection process. The career guidance cell organizes training programmes to crack competitive exams.

The student council comprises of leadership positions such as president, secretary, and council members that represents the students' interests in academic, sports, cultural, research activities in the college. The students have participated in 523 sports and cultural events/competitions during the assessment period outside the college. The alumni association of the college is an active body that brace the college with academic feedbacks and financial supports the students through scholarship. The association offers "The Pride of PPC" award for the alumni achievers.

#### Governance, Leadership and Management

Poornaprajna College is managed and governed by Sri Admar Mutt Education Council, Bangalore. The most revered saint His Holiness Sri Sri Vibudhesha Theertha Swamiji has shaped the idea of higher education institution appeared as Poornaprajna College in Udupi. The managing committee of the college headed by present President His Holiness Sri Sri Eshapriya Theertha Swamiji with a team of insightful stalwarts and renowned educationists who are determined to accomplish the vision of the founder.

The Principal leads the way to accomplish the academic, research, and non-curricular activities of the college. The college follows the virtue of decentralization and participative mechanism in curricular, co-curricular, and extracurricular activities. The grad success of 'All India Inter University Kabaddi Championship 2019-20' for Men is an example that sheds light on the practice of decentralization and participative management in college's activities.

Strategies are framed and implemented to identify slow learners as well as advanced learners at initial stage and necessary measures like peer teaching, outreach programmes are taken to encourage them towards the holistic development.

The college has adopted e-governance to manage the students' admission, administration, examination, and financial and account management. The college significantly emphasis to ensure the welfare of teaching and non-teaching staff through financial support, incentives, leaves.

Internal and External audits have been enabling the college to maintain transparency and quality governance in the system.

The college also mobilizes resources in the form of fund, intellectual property, and space to guarantee the

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hassle free performance of the system.

IQAC has contributed significantly towards institutionalizing quality by providing digital platform in workplace through the MoU with ICT Academy. During the pandemic the college extensively used ICT for conducting online classes and provided e-content to the students. The teaching learning process is monitored through summative and formative examination system, stakeholders' feedback. The analysis of the same is used for planning strategies to teaching learning reforms.

#### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

Our college hosts students from various districts of the state and a large number of these students are females. The college follows strict security measures, stringent rules, segregation of students' genders in classrooms, library canteen. Industrial and Field visits are organized with adequate amount of female staff members who accompany students. The college also offers common rooms for students, with multiple common rooms for females situated across campus. Gender equity is ensured on campus along with an atmosphere of cultural and regional inclusiveness to facilitate the education and college lives of the students from the various regions that get admitted here. Special provisions and policies are in place for Divyangjan students as well. Our institution celebrates various commemorative days, organizes festivals and provides an and atmosphere of inclusivity and equity and promotes harmony and tolerance.

While we have in place an inclusive and secure atmosphere, we also have a green campus that works towards conservation of energy and resources, waste minimization and environmental sustenance. We ensure we have in place energy efficient component, infrastructure that aides in minimizing energy consumption, utilization of solar energy, waste harvesting and conservation practices and efforts to make the campus a plastic freezone. To this effect, we are a Green Campus that is audited professionals and organize various programs and initiatives that raises awareness about environment among students.

#### **Institutional preparedness for NEP**

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

The state of Karnataka has already implemented the NEP at Under Graduate Level. Being an affiliated college, the college follows the re-designed syllabus approved for bachelor degree courses by Mangalore University. Apart from this, the college prepared itself to implement the structure of NEP in its curriculum through a NEP task force at college level. The college offers degree programmes in Arts, Science, and Commerce disciplines. In this line, students were given freedom to select the core papers and open electives of their choice from different disciplines. The University has provided the list of open elective courses under the multidisciplinary courses. Moreover, the students need to study

vocational courses, Indian Constitution and Environment Science, value based courses, and skill based courses that are embedded in the curricula. The Post Graduation students are facilitated to choose the elective papers that are available in other institutions. Awareness about the selection of online programmes/MOOC programmes offered by different institutions is created during the students' orientation. This eventually creates a platform to opt multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary courses even the college do not offers the programme. The college has awareness programmes, training session, and discussions among the faculty members about the effective implementation of the NEP to ensure diverse curriculum that is multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary in nature. 2. Academic bank of credits (ABC): The college is affiliated to Mangalore University which assure the implementation of ABC at the level of university. The ABC for the college will be either established by the University or by the College in an appropriate structure as per the guidelines by the University. 3. Skill development: Another visionary approach of NEP is Skill development among the academic degree holder. The college abided to offer the curriculum that integrates the skill enhancement courses such as Digital Fluency, Artificial Intelligence, Critical thinking, Financial literacy, creativity and innovation, Mathematical ability, critical thinking and Problem solving, entrepreneurship, professional communication, Cyber security, Cultural awareness in the first three years of Bachelor degree. Moreover, National Skills Qualifications Framework (NSQF) is considered while offering the skill development courses in the syllabus for different semesters. The level of skills as per the NSQF is reflected in the certification in a multiple entries and exit system of NEP. The college also has a practice of training students through functional MoUs. For instance, Bajaj Finserv has trained 45 students with necessary industrial skills. 4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge The college administration promotes the inclusion of system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using Indian Knowledge in curriculum. The college online course): encourages learning of the Mother tongue by the students. The college taught Kannada, English, Hindi and Sanskrit as languages and the students are free to

opt these languages as core papers. The students are free to learn the cultures such as Kodava, Konkani, Manipuri, and Arabic by selecting such languages as core/open electives offered by the colleges affiliated to Mangalore University. The college magazine 'Prajna' has been encouraging the students write articles in varied languages such as Kannada, English, Hindi, Konkani, Tulu, Malayalam, Gujarathi. The faculty members have been taking an active part in the propagation and development of Indian based cultures through their activities and publications. The same are made available to the students of the college. The curriculum also focusses on concepts like Ancient Indian history, Civilizations, Indian culture, Yoga, and Indian ethos, early inscriptions in creating awareness about Indian knowledge. The University has prescribed a course on 'History and culture of Tulunadu' which help students to obtain knowledge on the historical roots of South Canara region. Apart from this, the college has an Archaeology Museum that displays the local artefacts and culture. The 'Heritage Club' is actively organizes programmes that promotes the local as well as national culture. The college continuously promoting the Indian culture through academics. The Poornaprajna Amateur Astronomers' Club has made all its materials available in Kannada and created software that enable students to learn astronomy through Indian culture, in Kannada.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The college offers 11 programmes across Arts, Science, Commerce disciplines with languages. All these programmes are offered as outcomes-based education (OBE) programmes that impart the knowledge required at regional and global level. The courses are designed in such a way that they increase the disciplinary knowledge, self-learning, moral and ethical awareness, and develop the communication skill, problem solving techniques, reflective thinking capacity, and problem solving capacity. The cognitive abilities of the students are also enriched through these programmes offered by the college. The program outcome and course outcome are clearly mentioned in the syllabus so that the students ultimately get an idea about the significance of studying the programme. An awareness among the students has been created, about the program and course outcome. Hence, it helps them to plan and be

	placed in reputed companies or to obtain higher education in suitable streams.
6. Distance education/online education:	The global pandemic i.e. Covid -19 pandemic, has created a platform to impart the education in an online mode. The college efficiently handled the classes, assignments, students' seminars, parent-teachers meeting on the digital platforms. The faculty members extensively used the digital technologies to conduct online classes and provided digital content as study materials to the students during 2020-2021. The stakeholders of the college have gained experience of online education, access to online resources, and online examinations. Moreover, the college has been associated with Bajaj Finserv, ICT Academy, and Infosys Springboard to develop digital competencies among students through online ICT training. Thus college foresee this experience as an opportunity to impart online education which is intended in NEP. The college encourages the faculties to offer certificate courses for the students in online mode. The college has plans to impart online courses on par with the regular degree courses with

- Poornaprajna College is affiliated to Mangalore University and strictly follows the syllabus recommended by the parent University.

- Workload is distributed well in advance, among the faculty, in each department.

- Departments prepare Curriculum Plan and Deployment strategy, consisting of various methodologies for effective curriculum delivery, including chalk and talk, ICT modules, ppts and online classes (during pandemic) etc.
- Newly appointed faculty and freshers are given in-house Faculty Development Programs by various academicians regarding academics, research, evaluation as well as college administration.
- Each department presents a report of the previous academic year, highlighting result analysis, student and staff achievements of the department.
- For the students, the academic year begins with an orientation program for first years, which educates the code of conduct, familiarizes the clubs, associations, and various facilities available in the campus.
- Students are trained for EC and CC activities, which will help them to participate and secure prizes in intercollegiate, university, state and national level competitions.
- Students are offered with various certificate courses, which will earn marks for EC and CC activities as well.

#### **Certificate Course**

- College offers various subject related, skill-based and value-added certificate courses every academic year.
- The certificate courses are designed and streamlined based upon demands and current requirements of the students.
- The framing of new certificate course syllabus or updating existing certificate course syllabus will be done based on feedback from students, academicians and experts.
- The syllabus is framed by in-house subject experts and gets approved by the corresponding BOS.
- Certificate courses comprise minimum 30 contact hours, including theory and practical sessions.

- The students are evaluated based on their performance on given activities/practical sessions, and also end-course examination.

#### **Response:**

Poornaprajna College, which comes under Udupi Admar Matt Council administration, known for inculcating good values and ethics to the students, along with knowledge. With the vision of shaping an all-round personality of students, college makes a sincere effort to inculcate culture, human values, sensitiveness towards environment and professional ethics amongst the students through various activities organized by associations, cells and departments.

#### Sensitizing students towards values and ethics through syllabus

- Affiliating university has conceptualized, framed and introduced four fundamental courses on Indian Constitution, Human Rights, Gender Equity and Environmental Studies, to undergraduate students.
- College offers all these fundamental courses to all the undergraduate students of all the stream, through skilled faculties.
- Indian Constitution course addresses issues related to fundamental rights, fundamental duties.
- Course on Human Rights comprises human values, rights, duties, protection and promotion of Human Rights in India.
- Gender Equity course imparts the importance of human values, gender equity and equality in society, constitutional rights of women, protective legislation for women in India, national commission for women.
- Environmental studies course educates students regarding environmental pollution and its management, natural resources and management, environmental awareness and legislation.

- These courses, not only spread awareness amongst students, but sensitize them towards human values, ethics, gender and environment sustainability.
- Apart from fundamental courses, college offers business ethics and CSR courses to MCom students which mainly address human values and professional ethics in workplace.

#### Integrating cross-cutting issues through EC-CC curriculum

- College makes ardent effort to inoculate the ethics and values, an awareness towards gender and environment sustainability through co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.
- Departments and associations organize seminars and workshops on human value, professional ethics, gender, woman health related topics, that go beyond the syllabus prescribed.
- Associations like NSS and Eco club organizes various environmental related programs like vanamahothsava, garden making, maintenance and sustenance of greenery, etc., every year.
- Students who take active part in such programs, irrespective of their stream, will get credits for their EC CC activities. This will not only fetch marks for the students also make them knowledgeable.

#### Common practices to impart values in the students

- College organizes orientation programs every year to guide students about various culture and values to be followed and also about common/gender-based facilities available to address the various issues faced by them during their course.

# 2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

#### **Response:**

The college uses student-centric methods in teaching and learning process. The students participate in the learning process by actively involving in problem solving activities, seminars, presentations.

- The Department of Chemistry, Zoology, Botany and Physics make use of experiential learning and participative learning. The Department of Commerce, Mathematics and Statistics engage the students adopting the problem-solving method. Programs like Plant Collection, Sky watch, Vermiculture, Old age Home visit etc are conducted by various departments that make students to learn through participation and experiments.
- The faculty also adopt participative learning in the form of case studies in management class, roleplays in commercial law classes. The students in general are encouraged by various departments and associations to participate in quiz, debates and group discussions. Various field trips are organized for the students that keep them adept with real life applications of the subjects they learn, build skills they require after graduation and introduce them to the latest trends in the academic field of study.
- Outreach programs are organzied where the students teach high school and pre-university students on subject related issues.
- Even though Internships are not mandatory as per university guidelines, the students are encouraged to undergo internships in their vacations.
- Science students in particular are trained to take up research projects and the institution is among few of the top-colleges, whose students get selected for summer research projects held in Poornaprajna Institute of Scientific Research (PPISR), Jawaharlal Nehru Centre for Advanced Scientific Research (JNCASR).
- Team of PPC students visit and teach the students of nearby schools. The students also take active part in the activities of NCC, NSS, Rangers & Rovers, Youth Red Cross that help them to develop better human values and leadership qualities.
- The MoUs enabled us to put our students in training programs that develop skills that increases the employability.

#### 2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

#### **Response:**

- The college has initiated continuous and comprehensive internal evaluation in accordance with the norms of the Mangalore University. Two Internal examinations are conducted in each semester.
- The Internal Examination Committee holds the meeting to discuss the issues of conducting Internal Examinations. The committee prepares the exam time table of IA exams which is communicated to the students well in advance through notice boards and circulars.
- Faculty of concerned subjects submit a set of question papers through the Head of the Department to the Internal Examination Committee. A set of question paper are received by the Internal Examination Committee from the departments.
- The portions for the exams are announced in class as well as on the concerned Department's notice board well in advance.
- The answer scripts after valuation are shown to the students in order to ensure transparency and accountability. The student grievances regarding the valuations are also taken care of and redressed.
- For the fair conduct of internal examinations, the Internal Examinations Committee appoints

- internal squads to prevent malpractice.
- Sufficient time is given to faculty members to evaluate the answer scripts. The marks list for each subject is prepared by the respective faculty members and the same is entered in marks entry datasheets provided by the college office.
- Marks list of the students are displayed on the notice board.
- The college has undertaken initiatives to conduct online Internal Assessment examination during the Covid-19 pandemic.

# 2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

### **Response:**

- The examination related grievances are dealt with efficiently in a time-bound manner. The internal examinations are conducted according to the University academic calendar. The college has instituted an Internal Examinations Committee to address all grievances related to internal assessment marks, issues related to attendance etc.
- In case the students are unable to appear for internal examination, with prior permission, reexamination is conducted for them. The Internal Examination Committee, in consultation with the concerned department and faculty, schedules the re-examination for the absentees.
- During the conduct of examination, an internal squad is formed to curb any malpractice.
- The answer scripts after evaluation are shown to the students to clarify any doubts regarding valuation and marks awarded. The students are given sufficient time to inspect the answer script and then interact with the faculty members as well as HODs of the departments about the concerned issues.
- Further mentors discuss matters relating to student grievance relating to internal examination with students and their parents in Parent Teachers Association meet.
- In case of incorrect final IA marks, the students can notify the office staff to rectify the same. The office staffs rectify the incorrect IA marks in consultation with the concerned faculty member.
- Any other issue related to conduct of examination can be brought to the notice of concerned faculty or Principal through Grievance Redressal Cell. The Grievance Redressal Cell discusses the grievance related to IA examination at departmental level as well as at the college level, if required.

- The students achieve in getting seats in PhD in reputed universities.

# 3.2.1 Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and has initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

### **Response:**

The college supports, guides and provides the infrastructure for the students for various research and skill-based activities.

**Developing research culture among Undergraduate students:** 'Amrithanthu Vidya' (Knowledge has no end) are the words embedded in the college logo. The institution aims at students to acquire the research frame of mind at an undergraduate level which paves the way for greater avenues for research. Students have shown keen interest in innovations, surveys and participation in research training activities. The following are the highlights.

- Students have successfully designed a Sensor Based Automatic Sanitizer Dispenser' for the college and it has been installed in front of the college office for open use
- Students have installed 'Light sensing &Time controlled automated switching Device' for the street light with the aim of saving energy and automation.
- Students take part in the field visits, industrial visits and biodiversity surveys organized by various departments.
- College has MOU with Poornaprajna Institute of Scientific Research, Bengaluru and every year, about 20 students attend to the training programmes in basic research.
- Students actively participate in research culture oriented workshops/seminars organized by various departments/ Cells/Associations to get an exposure to different areas of research.

### Poornaprajna Amateur Astronomers Club (PAAC)

PAAC conducts number of Sky-watch programs and gives astronomical updates in its blog. Students conduct extension activities in nearby schools regarding demonstration of astronomical aspects and events.

Students have prepared more than 1000 Pinhole cameras and distributed to students of different High schools.

On every event of eclipse, Sky- watch program will be conducted by the PAAC. The Department of Physics has an observatory telescope for sky watch. Students will be trained to use the telescope and conduct sky watch.

### Research Cell

Research cell of the college conducts special lectures on research methodology for enlightening the faculty and students. It promotes research activities by the staff and the students. More than seventy research articles in peer-reviewed journals and 62 books/book chapters in reputed publications are the contributions by the staff and students in the field of research.

### d)EDP Cell:

EDP cell, in association with IQAC, conducts workshops, lecture series on Intellectual property rights, entrepreneurship skill- oriented seminars, faculty development programs for updating the research-based information and to motivate teachers and students. EDP cell in association with career guidance and counseling cell, organizes skill- oriented programs for the students to attain success during their placements.

### **Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

### 4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

### **Response:**

Poornaprajna College is situated in the heart of temple city Udupi, with a built-up area of **6.49 acres**, amidst lush greenery. The strategic location of the Poornaprajna institution offers easy access to all facilities that a modern metropolis has to offer, particularly health and transport facilities. Sri Admar Mutt Education Council, the governing body of the college, strives to meet the growing needs of the institution. College has 42 classrooms, with adequate furniture and projection facilities. It has a seminar hall, E-learning center, audio-visual room, and language lab. The college has 135 computing systems in the campus. There are 2 xerox machines and 21 printers.

Staffrooms are Wi-Fi enabled with computers. The science department has well equipped laboratories to conduct experiments and practical's as per curriculum; 2 for Physics, 3 for Chemistry, 2 for Botany, 1 for Zoology, 2 for Computer Science and 1 for Mathematics. The Computer laboratory is air-conditioned with 37 computers.

The Archeology Museum showcase artifacts, inscription, rare manuscripts and old coins. The Botany museum has vast collections of plant specimens with Moss herbarium, unique collections from Western Ghats and Coastal Karnataka. The Zoology museum has rare samples of animal collections.

The following **infrastructural facilities** reflect the policy adopted by the management to ensure quality education.

- The College has wide corridors of more than 2 meters width and broad stair cases at two ends.
- Open air theater for cultural shows and outdoor performances.
- Well equipped, furnished computerised library with provision for internet browsing, reference section and separate reading rooms for men and women students.
- Well equipped main auditorium with a seating capacity of 1200.
- Mini auditorium with seating capacity of 200.
- Well furnished ladies hostel which can accommodate 100 students.
- Well furnished men's hostel which can accommodate 70 students.
- Hygienically maintained canteen which can cater 200 students at a time, and provide food at a reasonable rate.
- Conveniently situated administrative office.
- Centrally situated Principal's chamber.
- Air-conditioned audio visual hall.
- Independent PG block with departments and classrooms.
- Independent departments with departmental library, laptop, desktop, printer, and internet facilities.
- Furnished, spacious, and ventilated 2 ladies rooms with attached wash rooms
- CCTV camera surveillance system.
- Power generators of 70KVA, 20KVA and two of 25KVA
- Purified and cooled drinking water facility

- 6 fire extinguishers in the science laboratories
- 3 vacuum cleaners

It allowed the users to check bibliographic details of books as well as its availability in library through 'simple' and 'advanced searches'. Moreover, the users can check the availability of books in library as well as remote reservation facility (hold) through WEB OPAC.

- 3. The large numbers of languages in Koha has available and with more languages added every year. Poornaprajna College Library has books in Kannada, Hindi, and Sanskrit languages. Koha supports to create catalogue for these books in different languages.
- 4. Catalogue entry for all types of information sources (Books, Journals, Magazines, Theses/dissertations, reports, and non-book materials) shall be made in Koha.
- 5. Koha offers customizable OPAC/Web OPAC to its users through which New Arrival display, highly Book recommendation, Book status, Book Reservation, Virtual Shelf, baskets features are available.
- 6. Koha provides powerful searching and enhanced catalogue display that can use full text content from Amazon, Google books, Open Library, Library thing etc.
- 7. Copy Cataloguing feature helps the library staff to avoid keying of cataloguing data.
- 8. Koha is supported different types of globally known library standards and protocols as like MARC21, UNIMARC, Z39.50, SIP2, SRU/SW, SIP/NCIP etc.

Desktop with internet connection and laptops is also provided to all the departments. The College is optimizing as far as the infrastructural upgradation is concerned. The College has a computer lab with an internet browsing facility. The College uses software including open source software like Open office, R, Maxima, Latex, Scilab, Linux, Python, Turbo-C and Antivirus for selected systems.

### **Cloud Storage**

The college has private cloud storge space which supports unlimited file size. The valuable data of the college, faculty members were uploaded to this cloud storage. The secured access the cloud storage is also ensured. Along with this, the College has access to complete G Suite. The faculty and students have been oriented and trained to use the tool. Because of Google Tools, the cloud barriers have been overcome and unlimited access to the digital world is enabled. The email ids of the faculty were provided under the 'ppc.ac.in' domain which showcases and enhances the official correspondence through a private email id. All the services of Google, such as Unlimited G Drive, Docs, Slides, Google Classroom, Google Sites, and Google forms – services are available to our faculty without any limit. The Department of Computer Science maintains website with web-based Content Management System (CMS). The college also has blog and YouTube channel which provides coverage to the activities held in the college. The major lecture halls with ICT facilities are also by all for conducting seminars and workshops.

### **Response:**

The college infrastructure holds very much importance, especially when it comes to providing various facilities to the students for education and health purposes. Buildings, classrooms, laboratories,

equipmentsetc - are crucial elements of learning environments in colleges and universities. Effective utilisation and proper maintenance of the same is essential to promote a better teaching- learning environment within the institution. # 6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules and procedures, etc.

#### **Response:**

The institution has a well defined mechanism of decentralization of authority and participative management system .Poornaprajna college is managed by Udupi Shri Admar matt ducation Council, Udupi. Management committee includes President- His Holiness Sri Sri Vishwapriya Theertha Swamiji, followed by the Secretary, Joint-Secretary, Treasurer and the Governing Council members, and other members of the College governing Council. The committee also includes Principal and staff representatives.

The governing council frames the policies, rules, objectives and standards on the basis of vision and mission of the college. It reviews the functioning of the institution regarding administration. management, initiation as well as implementation of diverse measures to strengthen the overall efficiency of the institution. It takes decisions on relevant issues according to the need and plan of the institution. However, the Chairman delegates most of his administrative powers to the Secretary, Joint-secretary and the Treasurer who take major decisions related to the Infrastructure, Sanctioning of funds and overall management of the Institution.

The Principal, IQAC of the College and council HOD's as well as representative from the office Management, conducts regular and ad-hoc meetings to discuss the various issues and policies of the institution. The council is empowered to give the suggestion to the college governing council on any matters. The policies framed by the governing council are implemented by the college council. The college council communicated the policies and standards set by the governing council to the next level of management to implement them. The College council encourages the suggestion on the implementation of the policies from the Teachers and stakeholders. The Principal and Vice Principals are involved in overlooking the implementation of the plans of the College. They ensure that regular day to day operations are properly conducted, through feedback from convenors, teaching and non-teaching staff. The Principal guides the College in academic progress, admission, staff recruitment and administrative matters. The Principal is the Chairman of the Staff Council, IQAC, Anti-ragging Cell, Disciplinary and the Library Advisory Committee.

The orders received from the college council through the principal are encouraged to impart suggestions for the implementation of the policies. Regular meetings of the staff are conducted to review the functioning of the college, adopt policy measures taken by the governing council and staff council. Heads of the Departments are responsible for the preparation of the Department time table, work allocation among teachers, review of Teacher's Diary, and submission of various reports to the Principal and IQAC. Class teachers are assigned for each class to ensure personal care, attention, guidance, counseling, evaluation and assessment of each student in the class. The staff members are allowed to communicate their requirements directly to the Principal or President or Secretary. The Heads of Departments ensure that the plans communicated to them are implemented systematically. Committees for co-curricular and extra-

curricular activities are formed at the beginning of the year and are assigned the tasks according to the institutional plans.

# **6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies**

- An annual increment to the salary is provided to all teaching staff members.
- Free first aid, emergency medical attention and concession in medical expenses are provided to all staff members at Adarsha Hospital, Udupi.

#### All the **non-teaching staff** are provided with the following benefits:

- Employees Provident Fund is paid by the institution as per govt. requirements.
- Employees' State Insurance is provided to all faculty members who are eligible.
- Uniform is provided to all Class IV non-teaching staff, free of cost.
- An annual, 'Best Attender Award' is given on college day.
- All non-teaching staff members who qualify for ESI are provided paid maternity leave for a period of 6 months. The college provides maternity leave for others that are not covered by ESI.
- An annual increment to the salary is provided to all non-teaching staff members.
- The Internal Quality Assurance Cell of our college organizes various seminars, conferences, training programs and Faculty Development Programs for faculty enrichment and nurturing the healthy and fruitful academic environment.

All students' welfare measures are extended to teaching and non-teaching staff including canteen facilities, sports, and parking facilities. Teaching and non-teaching staff members are provided the facility to use Indoor stadium and gym.

For the physical fitness and the wellbeing of all the staff members, an annual sports and games competitions are held among the teaching and non-teaching staff members with attractive prizes.

### 6.3.5 Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

#### **Response:**

The college has implemented four strategies to appraise the performance of teaching and non-teaching staff, which includes:

#### Teachers' Self appraisal

An annual self-evaluation form is required to be filled and submitted by every teaching staff member, to the IQAC for analysis and documentation. This provides the teachers with a scope for introspection of their teaching style, its impact on students and prospects for improvement, each year.

The questions framed in the form, focuses on how a teacher responds to various events that affect the pupils' learning process, their contributions and involvement in both academic and administrative tasks and the various educational and professional developments undertaken by them. The form also provides a means to report the various academic activities like paper presentations, publications and conference, workshops and FDPs attended in the previous academic year, to the IQAC. The IQAC then analyses the individual reports and reports the progress to the principal in the form of departmental reports. The IQAC, after evaluation of the faculty/department reports, conducts an academic audit that is shared with the departments. The teachers can use these analyses and reports to speed up or carry on their career development.

The entire procedure is carried out in a confidential manner. At the end of every academic year performance of teaching staff is appraised through department presentation.

#### **Teachers' Evaluation by Students**

Each year, the teachers' performance in the classroom environment is evaluated from the students' perspective through student feedback form that is based on NAAC recommendations. These feedbacks are collected every semester, with an appropriate number of feedbacks, collected for any given teacher, from students that are selected at random. Students' confidentiality is maintained which renders genuine feedback from these students about every faculty members, which are then sent personally by the principal, to the faculty members for examination.

An objective evaluation of performance is based on individual ratings received for various categories, while subjective evaluation is based on the students' thoughts and opinions on the teachers' academic achievement, both of which are collected in each feedback form.

The feedbacks are then evaluated, aggregated and reports prepared that are then analysed by the principal and management in addition to the self-appraisal report.

### Appraisal by the Head of the Department

In addition to the self-appraisal and students' feedback, each faculty member is evaluated by the head of their respective departments. The HODs provide a report on the basis of the teachers' accomplishments, discipline, quality and other factors that contribute to the department and institution's growth. Each semester, the Principal holds frequent meetings with each department head to discuss these results and their developments thereafter. The HODs are evaluated directly by the Principal for the same criteria.

### **Non-Teaching staff Appraisal**

The work efficiency of Non-teaching staff is monitored by an effective in-built mechanism. The feedback of Non-teaching staff is collected annually using a structured questionnaire. In the personal files of the non-teaching staff, a record of their performance is maintained. The office Superintendent reports their progress to the Principal regularly.

The institution has an internal control system where the Principal has the authority to approve of the transaction. Timely internal audit is done by a qualified auditor appointed by the management. The following is the year wise details of the internal audit and external audit:

**External Statutory audit:** It is done by a qualified auditor appointed by the Department of collegiate education, Government of Karnataka. It is in the nature of continuous audit in which the auditors check the accounts and highlights the errors. Auditors report is submitted to Udupi Sri Admar Mutt Education Council. Auditors appointed by the Department of Collegiate Education will audit the grant in aid received by the college and remittance of fees by the students and its proper utilization. UGC fund utilization is audited by the auditors appointed by the central government. The staff and management assists the audit process.

# 6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

# 6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

#### **Response:**

The Institute has a dedicated and dynamic Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and is constituted as per NAAC guidelines. The Cell meets regularly, deliberates upon relevant issues and takes decisions which, after approval of the Management, are vigorously implemented. The IQAC has been consistently striving to magnify the quality culture in all its spheres of the Institute's activities, by channelized efforts towards promoting holistic academic excellence. A look into the journey of IQAC would highlight the multifarious quality initiatives recommended and institutionalized.

Following are the list of practices institutionalized as envisaged by IQAC initiatives:

• Academic Administrative Audit (AAA) The National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) have evolved certain benchmarks for ascertaining and ensuring the quality at different levels. In this context, the IQAC has been instrumental in guiding the stakeholders to establish a quality environment in the college.

- The IQAC of College proposed to conduct an academic audit periodically. In preparation for the audit, the IQAC team organized a series of meetings to finalize various criteria for academic audit. Variables were selected to cover various criterion such as:
  - teaching learning process,
  - o research, consultancy and extension,
  - extra-curricular activities.
  - student support and progression
- IQAC directed the departments and administrative sections conduct programs and report the same in the prescribed format.
- AAA exercise has been done on an annual basis. From then onwards the AAA process was institutionalized at the behest of the IQAC as an annual exercise of the institution.
- Exploring digital platforms, resources and tools to connect teachers and students. IQAC insists the college library to disseminate digital form of information to the stakeholders which virtual enhances the teaching and learning process. Further, the Library has organized Orientation and Training Programmes on the use of NLIST E- resources, Reference Management Software for the students and faculty.
- The library maintains an E-resource Centre providing access to the N-list e- resources which help the academic community to search the e-resources from anywhere with the username and password provided by the INFLIBNET centre.

#### **Response:**

The Institute firmly believes that no stone would be left unturned so as to reach the pinnacle of success. Hence, the teaching-learning process has always been at the core of all our endeavors. The institution has at the helm of quality enhancement the IQAC which is committed to the advancement of quality of faculty and students by providing necessary directives and appropriate guidelines for quality assurance from time-to-time. It also undertakes periodic quality review at the college level. This Cell initiates and mandates continual evaluation processes and sustainable assessment mechanisms to achieve the academic goals of the institution. Many such improvements have been effectuated in the functioning of the Institution. The examples of Institutional reviews and successful implementation of teaching-learning reforms facilitated through IQAC are as follows:

#### **Example 1: Effectiveness of Teaching-Learning Process and Beyond**

- PTA meeting and Feedback: We have an effective mechanism for continuous evaluation of our UG students by internal assessments through formative and summative examinations. As part of this communication, teachers regularly meet parents to discuss what is being taught. In addition, counseling sessions are held to resolve students' academic or behavioral issues. We hold general (for the whole college) and class-wise PTA meetings periodically. The performance of each student is discussed in the presence of the parent/guardian, in the class- PTA meetings.
- Internal Examination: Internal examination Cell conducts two centralized internal examinations in each semester. The Internal Examination Cell prepares a Time table, seating arrangements, invigilation schedules for teachers and is displayed on the notice board well in advance. All question papers are collected from teachers and printing and reprography is done by the examination section in the assigned room. Consolidated internal mark sheet is published in the notice board for final correction, if there is any. Final internal marks are uploaded to the University site promptly every semester.
- Effectiveness of Teaching-Learning Process and Beyond The IQAC strives to coordinate and monitor effectiveness of teaching-learning process including learning outcomes which helps in maintaining robustness, academic integrity and discipline in teaching and learning.
- As recommended by the NAAC, effective steps have been taken to enhance the potential of ICT enabled teaching and learning. Number of classrooms with such facilities, internet bandwidth etc. have been steadily increased. Teachers are encouraged to extensively use ICT enabled tools and make the teaching-learning process more learner friendly. This has resulted in teachers using LMS like Google classroom, creating their lecture videos for the Institute's you-tube channel. College has established MOOCs-SWAYAM local chapter which has encouraged students and faculty to complete MOOCs and other courses on such platforms.
- The IQAC has been instrumental in initiating new ventures for enabling the potential learners, acquiring latest knowledge on the areas of relevance. This has been realized by seeking Institutional membership with ICT Academy. The participation of our faculty and students in ICT Academy initiated programmes viz., FDPs, Skill Development, Youth Empowerment /Digital Empowerment, Industry-Institute-Interaction programmes are very impressive.
- The effectiveness of processes and functions are reviewed through the conduct of Dry-Run and Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA). This improves the work culture of the departments and thereby ensures quality assurance of the institution
- Continuous review is ensured through discussions in the periodic meetings of the general Staff, Departments and IQAC.
- IQAC has been consistently progressive in bringing qualitative transformation in the Institute. This can be reflected through enhanced practical exposure through MOU's, Study, Field, Industry visits, encouragement to hands-on learning experience through Internships, adequate capacity building programmes for improving skills and competencies.
- Conducting Bridge Course and Refreshing Exercises, assessing the learning levels of the students as slow and advanced learners and initiating appropriate initiatives for their development and increasing the number of Add-on Courses have recorded incremental improvements.
- The outcome-based learning is achieved through a regular and continuous evaluation process. Further, the learning outcomes and attainment of results are appraised by the IQAC and reviews are suggested for further improvement aiming at holistic development of students.
- Effective Mentoring and Counseling system is in place to further strengthen student support and welfare.

#### Example 2: Review through structured Feedback mechanism

#### Review through Students' feedback on teaching:

The effectiveness of the teaching-learning process is periodically reviewed at the end of every semester through a well-structured online mechanism of collecting students' feedback on teaching. The feedback mainly focuses on the various teaching skills of the faculty and aspects such as knowledge of the subject, punctuality, presentation, communicative skill, innovative practices, completion of syllabus on time, etc. The score for each attribute is assessed and analyzed.

It is used to evaluate the knowledge, quality and ability of teaching faculty. Upon its review, appropriate suggestions for further improvements are recommended to the concerned faculty by the Principal wherever required. Thus, the feedback system helps a teacher to identify her/his strengths, weaknesses and challenges and work accordingly.

#### Review through Students' feedback on Institutional Performance:

It is yet another way through which IQAC reviews the level of students' overall satisfaction of educational services offered by the Institution and thereby initiates needful improvements in the system. Thus, the Institute reviews its teaching-learning process, structures and methodologies of operations and learning outcomes as directed by the inclusive thought process of IQAC.

### **Response:**

Amongst the many challenges faced by students, gender sensitization and awareness of gender equity among students is a matter we treat with priority.

We have in place Anti-Women Harrassment Cell in addition to Human Rights Cell that take care of gender sensitive issues. An annual gender sensitization action plan is also enforced along with the Anti-ragging and anti-women harassment policies on campus, that promote gender equity in matters of governance, teaching and day-to-day activities of the college.

In addition to the action plan, the college has, Anti-Women Harassment cell and Anti-Ragging cells that provide special attention to equal treatment of women on campus. College sees to it that as many associations and offices as possible, are assigned with staff and student conveners of both genders to follow gender equity and equality.

We offer Mid-Day meals to students of which, priority is given to female students, keeping in mind their safety and financial backgrounds.

The Ladies Forum is at the forefront of women empowerment on campus, organizing several programs every year that address issues related to women's health, women empowerment, role of women in society. It also acts as a motivating body, through programs like Women Achievers in India, inviting women who are resource persons from highly reputed institutions. Programs related to addressing issues of crimes and harassment are also organized by the forum. The Forum also organizes competitions that promote women empowerment and on occasions of gathering, organizes exhibition of crafts and decorative items prepared by its members.

The Rangers and Rovers units, the NSS Units of our college along with The Anti Women Harrassment Cell, organize programs, on the role of women in various industries and social issues action against harassment, regularly.

Various departments also organize programs that empower women and also the third gender. Departments have also organized outreach and awareness programs on gender sensitization through our students, enabling them to be educated and role models in this regard.

#### **Safety and Security**

- Our College is secured through a highly efficient security system.
- Every visitor/vehicular movement is tracked. Unauthorized vehicles are prohibited entry.
- 24x7 CCTV monitoring on campus.
- Safety of girls is also ensured during industrial visits and field trips.

- These are constantly cleaned, well-maintained with the hygiene regularly monitored.

#### **Response:**

Minimizing waste generation and achieving maximum recycling of waste is observed on campus and in cases where waste generation is unavoidable, proper waste disposal methodologies is followed.

The college management along with the units of National Service Scheme and National Cadet Corps work together towards raising awareness about waste and also work on waste management on campus.

We have also adopted the following strategies for waste management at Poornaprajna College:

#### • Solid Waste

- Awareness and implementation of 3R's Reduce, Reuse and Recycle are caried out to propagate and maintain eco-balance and green efforts on campus.
- Paper use is minimized in the college office and departments and the goal of achieving a 'Paperless' status is set. Partially printed papers are reused before being discarded, to achieve maximum utilization.
- The College is constantly working towards achieving the 'Plastic-Free zone' status by educating everyone on campus to reduce the use of Plastic on campus. Signs boards are put up as a constant reminder for this purpose.
- Associations and Forums organize programs and invited lectures on waste management.
   Waste recycling in the form of making paper carry-bags, reusing plastic bottles for decorative purpose are also taught to students.
- For unavoidable waste, waste bins are placed across campus for dry waste and wet waste is discarded near fauna for natural degradation and fertilization of plants.
- Students are encouraged to bring lunch boxes instead of plastic and paper wraps that lead to littering.
- E-Learning is also promoted keeping in mind, the goal to achieve 'Paperless' status and online assignments are practiced by various departments.
- Dry Recyclable waste is disposed off through scrap dealers, responsibly.

### • Liquid Waste:

• The presence of Chemistry, Botany and Zoology departments imply the generation of liquid waste for academic purposes. With this regard, since prohibition of the generation of such

waste is not feasible, triple dilution methods are practiced by the said departments before safely disposing the liquid waste.

• Water outlets from wash basins are directed towards plants for recycling.

#### • E-Waste:

- Electronic waste is generated on campus due to the presence of Physics and Computer Science laboratories. These departments are instructed to minimize e-waste generation with timely service and component testing performed to maximize the usage of various components.
- E-Waste generated through office and other departments are safely disposed off through scrap dealers and in certain cases, the devices stored indefinitely in a safe manner.
- College also prefers to purchase quality electronic goods and products for both day-to-day and academic usage thereby limiting e-waste generation through devices that have a long lifetime of usage.

#### • Bio-Hazardous Waste:

- There is little to no biomedical waste generated on campus for academic purposes, that can be termed hazardous.
- The presence of Radiation Emitting cells for Physics experiments are safely stored to prevent degeneration and waste-production.

Sanitary napkins in the ladies rooms are safely disposed through the use of Incineration methods.

#### **Response:**

With a diverse nation such as ours, regions surrounded by others that vary significantly in culture, language and socioeconomic conditions, our institution is well aware of the possible background of our students who hail from various regions of Karnataka and other states. Therefore, providing them with an inclusive and conducive atmosphere is our priority.

The reservation policies laid out by the Government of India are strictly followed during the allocation of seats for various courses. Appoints of teaching and non-teaching staff is also conducted with strict adherence to these policies.

At Poornaprajna college, it is our mission to **impart values through the education we offer that enables a student to become a good citizen tomorrow**. We enlighten the students about their duties, rights and their obligation to the Indian national flag.

The university requires all colleges to include in their curriculum, a paper each on Constitution of India and Human rights, which is mandatory for all undergraduate degrees. Along with the subject taught, we have the Preamble of the Constitution of India displayed on various notice boards across campus from time to time. These initiatives, along with the subjects, enable the students to acquaint themselves about the constitution and its values, ensuring a sense of obligation and awareness about their duty to the nation.

The college library also makes available, several books on the Indian Constitution, available in English and Kannada, for the students to refer.

The student council, governed by the Student Welfare Office is managed by representatives of each

class and this council is inaugurated every year with an oath taking ceremony and this oath has been designed keeping in mind the constitutional values. The inauguration is presided over by H.H. Sri Viswapriya Theertha Swamiji, who speaks on the occasion about the students' responsibilities towards the nation and its development. His Holiness and his founder before him, have always incited patriotism through their words of wisdom on such occasions.

Several programs are organized that educate students about their responsibilities and duties and the constitution of India. Constitution day and Sadbhavana Diwas are celebrated each year by various associations and departments. National movements like the Swacch Bharat Mission, Swadeshi Abhiyan, Digital India initiatives and Fit India Movements are celebrated and integrated into our programs. National Road Safety Day, Kannada Rajyotsava, are also celebrated.

Our college hosts NCC army, NCC navy along with two units of NSS, a unit of Rangers & Rovers and a unit of Youth Red Cross, which motivate the numerous volunteers and cadets to abide the constitutional values. These students take part in the Independence Day and Republic Day programs held every year in their respective troops and also in the district activities on these national days. They also utilize such occasions to visit old age homes and orphanages to unite with the residents, demonstrating acts of kindness and compassion.

During moments of breach of national security and on instances where security personnel lose their lives, serving the nation, the NCC units organize vigils and offer tribute to the heroes. Kargil Vijay Diwas is celebrated and Martyr's day is observed every year by our students.

Cadets of NCC demonstrated exercised their duties and responsibilities towards the nation through the task of packaging food for the needy during the Covid-19 crisis. Along with the them, volunteers of NSS also took part in an initiative that helped local farmers cultivate their crops and extended their support towards agriculture and the local community.

#### 2. Objectives of the Practice

What is an institution without a vision to carry forward and a mission to achieve? As the name suggests, Poornaprajna – Complete awareness is a path one must take for better life. Knowledge is endless, and 'education' must aim towards not only learning what is known, but to dwell into the unknown. A 'student' of Poornaprajna must therefore develop the required skills to achieve this awareness and in the process develop a curious temper - a research aptitude, to know what is not yet known. On this path of awareness, one can realize dreams and become self-relying universal citizen – A Vishwamanava, which is our mission.

#### 3. The Context

While our institution provides education at the under-graduate and post-graduate level, we prepare them during their course for a future in academics, research or the corporate world – a path of their choosing. Any path they choose, provides endless opportunities, but only to those fully prepared. Those with courage, insight, creativity and most importantly, a mindset to succeed.

The institution has imbibed it into our code, since inception, to lead the student into this world of opportunities, fully prepared, by imparting in them, the necessary skill-set or a thirst for research through experiential learning during the course.

This is possible with infrastructure, such as state of the art laboratories, library and modern classroom facilities, guided by highly dynamic and qualified teachers, enabling students in realizing their future prospects. A plethora of EC & CC activities, skill-oriented and research-oriented certificate courses must be provided to students, to leave no stone unturned, on this path of realization.

#### 4. The Practice

Skillset and Research temperament is developed via the various opportunities provided in addition to their curriculum:

- Our programs are planned based on assessment through aptitude tests and mentorships, which helps us in gauging their abilities, strengths and weakness.
- Outreach programs are organized by every department. Science departments demonstrate various experiments while the commerce and humanities take up the role of imparting essential knowledge. Here, our students are the resource persons and take up the role of teaching high school students. They develop communication skills and build a better understanding of their subjects.
- Certificate courses with 40 hours contact classes are conducted by every department for everyone. These courses range from being skill-oriented (Epigraphy by History, Python Programming by Computer), research-oriented (Crystal Growth by Physics, Chromatography techniques by Chemistry) and future-oriented (preparation for competitive exams by Mathematics, Sociology and Economics) courses.
- Academicians and Scientists from various domains are invited, enabling interactions and guidance for our students. Scientist from ISRO, CSIR labs and other reputed research institutes have visited us. Prof. C.N.R Rao & Prof. U.R.Rao have also visited us.
- In collaboration with PPISR, we receive scholars and professors who update our students in the latest research in the subjects and every year, a group of students are sent there to be trained by scientists.

- Participation in Internships, Research fellowships, Visiting-student programs, Talent Search and Training programs, are encouraged, giving a glimpse into the corporate world and the realm of research.
- Invited Talks, Seminars, Webinars and Workshops are organized, which brings in people at the top of their field like Charted Accountants, Entrepreneurs, Doctors, Counsellors etc. on campus and interact with our students.
- Workshops and orientation programs like E.g. 'A Career in Charted Accountancy', 'Mock Interviews' etc. are organized for students to understand the nature of work.
- Students who wish to take up careers in the creative arts are enabled to do so through competitions, activities organized by Speakers Club and Cultural Association, for them to excel at.
- Students are also taken on Industrial Visits, Study Tours and Visit to Science centres for a clear understanding of their fields.
- N.C.C army and Navy units are in place to train students to join the armed forces and develop skills and discipline. Rangers & Rovers and Youth Red Cross units are also in place to impart compassion and social responsibility. An excellent training is provided to students, in various Sports and Games event.

#### 5. Evidence of Success

Our efforts have been fruitful as is seen in the large number of students that become successful in life and build great careers.

- 266 students have been placed in highly reputed companies Infosys and TCS through Career Development Cell and several others are working in companies like Apple and Amazon.
- A good number of students are selected every year, for Summer Research Fellowships at premier institutions like TIFR, JNCASR, CCMB and IITs.
- The evidence of this practice being followed since decades, is the fact that several of our alumni have secured reputed positions as scientists in CSIR Labs, professors and teachers at institutions of repute like MIT. Majority of our science students, join higher studies of which a good number that pursues research from IISc, MIT etc.
- Not only are our students well-trained in academics but their skill development can be witnessed through the many alumni who are currently in the field of creative arts and the movie industries.
- 2 of our NCC cadets have joined the armed forces, in the current period of assessment, as commissioned officers.
- During their courses, our students demonstrated high level of discipline and skills, visible in the number of national-level camps that our students get selected to participate in, and bring laurels to our institution through their performance there.
- We've produced well-trained athletes and sportspersons that have, in the past 5 years won over 30 medals and trophies at various state and national-level sports events.
- Ms. Prajna, currently in III B.Sc. is a national-level athlete and an INPSIRE scholar a proof of multidisciplinary excellence from our students.

### 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The following are the problems encountered in pursuit of research and skill training:

- The curriculum set by the university does not match to those of other universities. It offers 3-subjects-major system which dilutes the amount of study per subject, reducing the scope of indepth study.
- The current system prevents us from devoting enough time for add-on and certificate courses along with EC & CC activities.
- A large number of students who hail from rural background, are hesitant to venture our into the field of entrepreneurship and research.
- Our laboratories are only well equipped for curriculum-based studies and not advanced enough to carry out cutting-edge research, preventing more students from taking up research on campus.
- The covid-19 pandemic posed a great challenge with the students being distanced from physical interaction with resource persons and teachers. However, online programs were conducted to ensure interactions.

### 7. Notes (Optional)

The implementation of this practice is thoroughly examined by the IQAC, understanding the various challenges, trends in admission and advancements in teaching methodologies to improve upon and update this practice. With each iteration, our students are offered the best of knowledge, skills and activities.

Our governing council and management also observe these practices, obtaining student feedback and multilevel appraisals to ensure that the quality of our offerings are always moving in an upward trajectory. They motivate the staff members constantly to update their skills, qualifications and upscale their teaching capacities.

Most importantly, the result of these best practices coupled with the respect and adoration we get from our students towards the teachers and institution, in addition to the feedbacks that students provide us about the latest trends, keeps us aware of our efforts and enables us to improve upon.

#### **Title of the Practice 2**

Development of Values through education and community service, in contribution towards national development.

#### 2. Objectives of the Practice

While our first practice focuses on obtaining knowledge, Poornaprajna – a complete awareness, also demands passing on this knowledge. A student must therefore not only obtain education, but also use this education contribution to the society. The education we provide is not just a piece of paper, but also, values that encourage community service. We therefore work towards building individuals with a strong sense of social responsibility that feel the urge to contribute, in any terms, to society and build the nation.

Nation building is not just limited to students, but is also by teachers. While our teachers teach the citizens of tomorrow, we believe a teacher must oblige in providing society with their knowledge and skills whenever necessary, thereby strengthening the community and building a strong nation. Students who follow these teachers, naturally believe it is an essential duty of one to contribute to the community.

#### 3. The Context

While 'Educated' means a degree-holder in a strict sense, the true sense of this word comes in the form of a person who has gained not only knowledge, but values. As students spend their time on campus, attending various theory classes, laboratory sessions, physical training and certificate courses, those students must also learn, the value of human connection, practice compassion and work for humanitarian causes.

At our college, we train our students in terms of skills and also impart value education through our teachers who are role-models to our students. The university mandates EC and CC activities and materializes it by offering marks. Our students are taught to embrace these activities and help the community by lending hands, teaching them and helping them in any form possible. Our students are taught, every task, cleaning or teaching, is noble and must be done with passion and good intention.

#### 4. The Practice

Values are imparted and the community benefited through the following ways:

• Every department organizes outreach programs each year, where our students visit various schools

nearby and under the guidance of the teachers, demonstrate their knowledge and teach the school students. Science through experiments, importance of language and vocabulary, career counselling and guidance are some of the topics taught and discussed. Some departments discuss and raise awareness on social issues and national missions at these schools. Various Associations and clubs also organize outreach programs spreading their philosophies and expertise.

- 'Nation First' a social service group by the NCC Army wing organizes awareness, cleanliness and fitness drives, visits orphanages, old age homes and schools for the community. *They have also helped farmer in agricultural work and rendered service to authorities through packing food and necessary items for the needy, during the Covid-19 lockdown*.
- The Navy wing of N.C.C the college is also active in providing the community with the necessary awareness and service programs.
- The NSS units of the college works constantly towards community service, raising awareness on various social causes and promote health and fitness through rallies and awareness drives. They develop communities during the Annual Special Camp and other camps, render service to various associations and institutions and have also produced and distributed over 500 face masks to Asha workers during Covid-19 crisis.
- The Rangers & Rovers and The Youth Red Cross units also work towards community development through numerous services and awareness programs. These units, along with NCC and NSS units, work constantly towards helping the community in times of need and raising awareness on important social issues like AIDS, Anti-Tobacco, Diabetes prevention, Environment day etc. They also organize Blood Donation Camps on campus every year.
- Our faculty members are regularly contacted by media as experts and resource persons, helping us spread the right information to the community.
- The Poornaprajna Amateur Astronomers' Club (PAAC) renders public service through press release about future astronomy events. Astronomy calendars, posters are also released for the public and provides free consultation in procurement of telescopes and optics.
- During the eclipse of 2019, PAAC team visited reached over 700 high schools throughout Karnataka to raise awareness about safely viewing the eclipse.
- Students of PAAC have build scaled down models of ISRO rockets and displayed them for aspiring students during outreach programs.
- Many departments host various teachers training workshops that help the teaching community update their knowledge and skills. Our faculty members are also regularly invited to give talks and seminars at various institutions to share their knowledge.

#### 5. Evidence of Success

Success of this practice is visible in the form of the reputation of Poornaprajna College that has helped the community since 1960.

• In the past 5 years, nearly 250 outreach programs have been organized, with a fifth of them being conducted during the pandemic period. Over 50% of these outreach activities were conducted by our students. This trains our students and creates passion for teaching and community service

- within them. This is evident through the fact that Udupi district is filled with teachers and professors who are students of Poornaprajna College.
- Our efforts have built leaders and communicators who are desired by recruiters (Infosys, Northern Trust etc.) who keep coming back looking for 'PPC' students to recruit.
- Evidence of this practice being in place for decades is in the fact that our alumni from the 1980s and 1990s batches are today well known for their social service. These alumni involve the current students in their acts of social responsibilities, that are a result of this best practice.
- For his efforts of Eclipse awareness during the Annular Eclipse of 2019, Dr. A.P. Bhat was recognized as 'Public Hero' by Public TV and several members of PAAC felicitated.
- Several institutions and organizations that benefited from our outreach programs and community service activities, have appreciated the institution and our students for their efforts and the results brought to the cause.
- Farmers who were helped by our students have harvested large volumes of rice and other crops.

### 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The following are the problems encountered in pursuit of community service:

- While we are motivated and passionate about contributions to the community, several activities require financial support regularly. For example, the Annual Special Camp isn't funded sufficiently by the University and requires constant collection of contributions from our alumni.
- The course curriculum constantly interferes with the time set for these activities causing several discrepancies every now and then.
- No separate funds are allotted to associations and clubs that contribute towards society. This sets back the clubs from stepping up without the fear of financial burden.
- The lack of social awareness in some instances also prevent some clubs and organizations from successfully and efficiently executing some services.

#### 7. Notes (Optional)

Several associations, institutions and organizations constantly approach Poornaprajna College for their activities, remembering us for our contributions to the society. Nehru Yuva Kendra, Pilikula Regional Science Center, Rotary Club, Lion's Club and several other organizations that render public service through awareness, activism and education have preferred Poornaprajna College for our service. These organizations also help us demonstrate our knowledge and skills and help us to reach out efficiently the community.

Our teachers are also invited by government bodies and news media houses whenever something out of the

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ordinary is observed. May it be Species identification, an unknown astronomical phenomenon or consultation or public awareness in any field, our college always steps forward through these institutions and helps spread the knowledge.
